

## Research Notes Introduction

Research notes are generally shorter pieces than full articles, usually between 2,000 and 3,000 words in length. They are not peer-reviewed as are other articles but are reviewed by the editor. It is expected that these articles will be written in an academic form and at a level of quality similar to other articles.

Research notes provide an opportunity for students, scholars and researchers to share information about projects that are underway or about information that has been released that will be of interest to others, before the projects or analysis has been completed. Hence, these Research Notes encourage feedback which can contribute to the on-going project.

Abstracts are not required for Research Notes.

The criteria by which materials will be accepted for Research Notes will be:

1. The article contributes new information or theories that will be useful to other scholars and professionals working in ministry.
2. The article is written in an appropriate academic form for publication in the Journal.
